

SCRUB TYPHUS

Scrub typhus is an infectious disease, transmitted through the bites of infected chiggers (larval mites). It involves acute onset, varied manifestations and causing life-threatening severity, but getting appropriate treatment will speed up the recovery process. Scrub typhus mostly occurs in rural and mountainous areas. It often appears sporadically, possibly occurs all year round and peaks in the spring - summer autumn months.

() Symptoms



Fever: often sudden; continuous high, may be accompanied by chills, headache and body aches.



Skin and mucosal manifestations:

- Bleeding spots on the skin, possibly slight edema under the face and instep's skin and eye congestion.
- Skin ulcers: oval in shape, 0.5-2cm in size, with black scales or they have scabbed to form ridged; usually painless, localized in soft skin areas such as armpits, chest, neck, groin, abdomen, etc.
- Skin rash: usually appears at the end of the first week of the disease, distributed mainly on the trunk, possibly on the limbs.



Swollen lymph nodes: swollen lymph nodes at the the ulcer area or in the whole body; size 1.5 - 2cm, soft, painless and normal mobility.

Prevention



Wear discreet clothes, clothes impregnated with insect repellent chemicals, apply insect repellent chemicals such as diethyltoluam id on exposed skin.



Kill rats, use insecticides, find a weed killers or burn weeds.
